# **IMST School Discipline Policies**

IMST wants each student to enjoy a secure learning environment and a rich educational experience.

This discipline policy was developed to promote consistency and encourage appropriate behaviors requiring students to become increasingly more responsible. We believe that students can make intelligent choices if they clearly understand the rules and the consequences for inappropriate behaviors. We expect parents to recognize the importance of school rules and to cooperate with their enforcement. Hence, we ask that parents and students read and discuss this brochure.

We know that the vast majority of our students are considerate, well-behaved and responsible. We will make a consistent effort to notice, praise and reward these positive behaviors.

Consequences for inappropriate behavior should include opportunities for the student to learn from his/her mistake. Whenever possible, students should be included in intervention programs that will help them acquire the skills to make positive choices in the future.

#### STUDENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- To attend school regularly
- To wear our school uniform daily
- To be on time and prepared to work
- To bring required materials and assignments
- To know and comply with school rules
- To treat staff and fellow students with respect regardless of ethnic group, religion, gender, color, race, national origin and physical or mental ability
- To respect public and private property
- To follow directions of school staff
- To behave in a way that does not disrupt the learning of others
- To leave all electronic devices at home

### PARENT RESPONSIBILITIES

- To send students to school neat, clean appropriately dressed in the school uniform
- To ensure that your child is on time to school every day and remains in school for the entire day
- To instill in students an attitude that school is important
- To schedule and attend school conferences when appropriate
- To inform the school of tardiness due to personal reasons
- To be available to school staff during the day by informing the school of current phone numbers for home, work or emergency
- To cooperate with school staff in helping students with academic, discipline or attendance problems
- To notify the school whenever a student cannot attend
- To know and comply with classroom and school rules and review the requirements with students
- To treat staff, students, fellow parents, and community partners with respect regardless of ethnic group, religion, gender, color, race, national origin and physical or mental ability

#### TEACHER RESPONSIBILITIES

- To establish classroom expectations for behavior
- To require compliance with classroom and school rules and review consequences
- To teach the prescribed courses of study in a professional manner.
- To maintain a safe and well-organized classroom environment conducive to learning
- To make every attempt to communicate with parents and administrators when student behavior is unsatisfactory
- To treat parents, students and fellow staff members with respect regardless of ethnic group, religion, gender,, color, race, national origin and physical or mental ability
- To be consistent in applying classroom and school rules

## ADMINISTRATOR RESPONSIBILITIES

- To inform staff, students, and parents regularly about school and district discipline standards
- To be consistent in applying the school discipline policy
- To thoroughly investigate before determining if a violation has been committed
- To treat students with respect and always allow them to tell their side of a discipline issue
- To treat teachers, parents, and staff members with respect regardless of ethnic group, religion, gender, color, race, national origin, and physical or mental ability.
- To inform parents immediately or as soon as possible about student discipline matters
- To provide parents with information regarding the process of any disciplinary procedure

Unacceptable student behavior is grouped from the least serious to the most serious. Repeated disregard of school rules leads to increasingly serious consequences. These rules apply while students are on school grounds, while going to or coming from classes, during the lunch period and outside breaks in the playground area, and during, or while going to or coming from a school sponsored activity such as athletic events, school bus routes, and other extra/co-curricular activities.

#### CLASSROOM EXPECTATIONS

Teachers will establish classroom rules and inform students and parents/guardians about these guidelines. Rules will specify both behavior and academic expectations that the student must meet to be successful. Examples are coming to class on time, bringing the required materials, and following teacher directions. If classroom rules are disregarded and learning is disrupted, the teacher will take one or more of the following actions:

- student/teacher conference
- teacher-held detention
- additional assignments
- send a student to school counselor
- exclusion room referral

- parent contact/conference
- office referral
- suspension from class

#### SCHOOL EXPECTATIONS

Schools will establish standards of behavior that promote positive school climate and campus safety. Parents/guardians and students will be informed about these guidelines. Examples of behaviors that are disruptive and not acceptable are:

- inappropriate dress
- disrespect to other students
- disrespect to school staff
- · loitering in restricted areas
- profanity/abusive language
- littering

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- possession of electronic devices such as tablets and/or laptops and cell phones
- defiance or disobedience
- forging or falsifying school information/correspondence

All undesirable behaviors have been classified into three categories according to the level of the behavior. The consequences that are to be implemented need to be logical consequences meaning they are reasonable, related to the action, proportional to the severity of the infraction and carried away in a manner that remains respectful of the student. The consequences can either be carried through by the teachers or the administration according to course of action that will be detailed below. All teachers are required to document every infraction a student commits.

Definitions of specific behaviors and terms have been attached below.

#### **Level 1 Infractions: Minor Offenses**

Level 1 infractions are minor violations of school rules. These behaviors typically disrupt the learning environment but do not cause harm or pose a serious threat to the school community.

- € Dress Code Violations: Wearing clothing that does not comply with the school's dress code policy. (not coming into the school as long as they don't wearing uniform)
- € Disruptive Behavior: Talking out of turn, minor classroom disruptions(excessive talking), or distracting others.
- ∉ Failure to Complete Assignments: Consistently not turning in homework or classwork on time.
- € Unauthorized Use of Electronics: Using mobile phones, tablets, or other electronic devices during class without permission.
- € Eating/Drinking in Class: Consuming food or beverages in class where it is not allowed.
- ∉ Rough Play (obvious play without bad intention and it turns into physical)
- ∉ Refusal to participate in program of instruction
- ∉ Excessive calling out shouting / using inappropriate voice in the class
- ∉ Littering in the classroom / writing in desk
- ∉ Inappropriate use of electronics devices in ICT / Class projects
- ∉ Repeated failure to bring equipment to class

#### **Level 2 Infractions: Moderate Offenses**

Level 2 infractions involve more serious behaviors that disrupt the educational process or violate the rights of others. These actions may involve repeated Level 1

behaviors or more significant misconduct.

- ∉ Chronic Tardiness: Repeated instances of arriving late to class.
- ∀ Vandalism: Damaging or defacing school property or the property of others.
- ✓ Not following directions given by school staff/ Defiant / Threats to adults
- Ø Defiance: Refusal to follow instructions from school staff, resulting in a disruption.
- ∉ Inappropriate Physical Contact: Pushing, shoving, or other non-serious physical contact.
- ∉ Inappropriate Language/Behavior: Using offensive language or gestures directed at others.
- ∉ Failure to complete a minor consequence

#### **Level 3 Infractions: Severe Offenses**

Level 3 infractions represent serious violations that pose a threat to the safety and well-being of students, staff, or the school environment. These behaviors often result in immediate and significant disciplinary actions.:

- ∉ Physical Assault: Intentionally causing physical harm to another person.
- € Drug/Alcohol/ Tobacco/ Vapes Use or Possession: Possessing, using, or distributing drugs, alcohol, or other controlled substances.
- ∉ Theft: Stealing school property or the property of others.
- ∉ Major Vandalism: Causing significant damage to school property or the property of others.
- € Sexual Harassment/Assault: Engaging in unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, or other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature.
- ∉ Threats: Making threats of violence or harm against others.
- ∉ Arson: Deliberately setting fire to school property.
- ∉ Gambling: Engaging in unauthorized betting or gambling activities on school premises.
- ## Hate Speech/Discrimination: Engaging in behavior or speech that targets others based on race, gender, religion, or other protected characteristics.
- ∉ Inappropriate use of chemicals, equipment, objects and machinery with the potential to cause harm
- ∉ Leaving school without permission
- ∉ Truancy: Leaving class or the school premises without permission.
- € Cheating/Plagiarism: Engaging in dishonest practices during tests or assignments.
- ∉ Skipping Class/Hiding
- ∉ Forgery: Signing or altering school documents without authorization.

## **DEFINITIONS OF SPECIFIC BEHAVIORS AND TERMS**

<u>Abusive Language/Malicious Teasing</u> - Any words or gestures intended to insult, hurt feelings or show defiance. Remarks or actions intended to harm another student or see him/her suffer.

<u>Aggressive/Intentional Fighting</u> — Willful intent to injure another student. A student who aids or abets the infliction or attempted infliction of physical injury to another person may be suspended.

Appropriate Dress: School Uniform as determined by International Maarif Schools of Tunis.

<u>Bullying</u> - A student or group of students that through repeated physical, written, verbal or other means, harass, sexually harass, threaten, intimidate, cyberbully, cause bodily injury to, or commit hate violence against any other student or school personnel (

<u>Cyberbullying</u> – The transmission of harassing communications, direct threats, or other harmful texts, sounds, or images on the Internet, social media, or other technologies using a telephone, computer, or any wireless communication device. Cyberbullying also includes breaking into another person's electronic account and assuming that person's identity in order to damage that person's reputation

<u>Detention/Study Hall:</u> Restriction from normal school activities such as recess and lunch, for disciplinary or other reasons as determined by the school administration. Detaining a student beyond the normal school day as determined by the teacher or principal as allowed under district policy. **Disruption of School Activities** – Irresponsible interruptions of the learning process of other students will be followed by a consequence. Repeated disruptions may lead to suspension.

Disrespect to Others Students/Staff - Failure to be courteous or thoughtful towards other students/staff. Behavior and/or language which degrades the unique qualities of an individual such as race, ethnicity, culture, heritage, sexuality, physical/mental attributes, religious beliefs or practices, will not be tolerated and may be cause for suspension and/or expulsion. Individuals who believe they have been subjected to such language or behavior should report the incident to a teacher or administrator.

**Expulsion** - Students can be denied attendance at all schools within the school district for a specified period of time. The reasons and procedures for expulsion are prescribed by State law. Students can be expelled only by the Board of Education,

<u>Fighting</u> - Students are responsible to settle their differences in a civil manner. A student who allows him/herself to be provoked into fighting will be considered as guilty as the one who starts the fight.

- Assault Assault is the unlawful attempt, coupled with the present ability, to commit a violent injury on the person of another. The injury does not have to occur; an attempt to do so constitutes an assault.
- Battery Battery is striking or touching another person with the intent to harm. If the assault or battery is serious enough, it will be classified as a Level III offense and the student will be recommended for expulsion.

<u>Sexual Harassment</u> - Unwelcome sexual advances and other verbal or physical contact of a sexual nature constitutes sexual harassment when it creates an intimidating, hostile or offensive environment. Students should report such incidents to school staff. Sexual Harassment, are available at each school site. Only students in grades 4-12 may be suspended for sexual harassment, per education code.

School Property – Includes, but is not limited to, electronic files and databases.

<u>Suspension From School</u> - Removal of a student from school for 1-5 days. Students may not be on or near any school campus or may not participate in any school-sponsored activity during the period of suspension

<u>Suspension On Campus</u> – Removal from class and/or other school activities.

<u>Willful Defiance</u> - Students are responsible for hearing and following the directions of adults in authority without undue delay. All adults who work at the school have the right and responsibility by law to supervise student behavior.
